Within about a month, we celebrate Mother's Day and Father's Day. Sandwiched in between those celebrations is Memorial Day, a time when we remember not only our loved ones who have died, but also an occasion to consider those in the military who have sacrificed so much so that we may live in freedom. Where would we be as individuals if we did not have the love and support of parents and loved ones? Where would we be as a country if we did not have the men and women who bravely served this country?



I don't know how you would answer those questions. However, I firmly believe that life would not be as rich and full. Therefore, I believe it is proper and right not only to set aside specific days to honor these people, but also always to show proper respect to those who have given and sacrificed so much for us.



If that is how we honor and respect certain people, what should our reverence and thanks be for what God has done? Where would we be without Him? The psalmist ponders that as he declares: "If the Lord had not been on our side . . . the flood would have engulfed us, the torrent would have swept over us," (Ps. 124:2a, 4). The author of the psalm is using poetic language to picture what would have happened if God was not with us. We would be swept away. We would be no more. Considering the whole teachings of the Bible, we realize that this applies to our lives both physically and spiritually.

But the good news declared to us is that God is there for us. We see this throughout the Bible. But it becomes the clearest for me as I ponder Jesus' life and work. As we look at Jesus, it is vital to remember that he came to serve all of humankind – including you.

With this in your mind and out of a grateful heart, I encourage you to show honor, respect and thanks to God our Father and our Savior, Jesus Christ. Worship regularly. If you are out of town on a weekend, find a local church to worship in or join us on Thursday evenings. Let your thanks be shown through your offerings, which help us to carry on God's work. And just as people may display flags or place flowers on graves to show their love, I invite you to display God's love in your life so that others may see what He has done for you.


Where would we be if God was not there for us? We would be swept away. But thanks be to God that He cares for us and that He is able to supply us with all that we need.

LWML will reconvene in September, but here is an overview of recent activities and service opportunities.

With proceeds from our fundraiser, we were able to send \$200 to the Salvation Army for food for flood workers; \$150 to the "Praise on the Prairie" event; \$200 to national LWML mission projects; \$100 to Ken and Carol Bunge, Lutheran Bible Translators; \$100 to sponsor Pastor Dave, Tim and Tina Deitemeyer in the FirstChoice Clinic golf event; \$25 to sponsor Rhonda Hoge in the Mission Walk at the national LWML convention in Peoria; and \$350 over the past six months to provide gas cards for people who stop at church asking for assistance. 

Just because the end didn't come doesn't mean the end isn't coming

Now that our world has survived the latest doomsday deadline, what are we to think? Unfortunately, this failed prediction may lead some to conclude that the end of the world must lie in the distant future. It may lead others to think that no end is coming.

Our Lord reminds us He will come again. Although the hour remains unknown, "No one knows about that day or hour...For in the days before the flood, people were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, up to the day Noah entered the ark; and they knew nothing about what would happen until the flood on the fringe of faith, there is still time. That is why came and took them all away. That is how it will be at the coming of the Son of Man," (Matt. 24:36-39).

Therefore, Jesus cautions his people to wait expectantly: "Be dressed and ready for service and keep your lamps burning like men waiting for their master to return from a wedding banquet so that when he comes and knocks, they can immediately open the door for him," (Luke 12:35-36).

Jesus also makes it clear that our lives on earth cannot be predicted. Although we assume we have ample days left, death can come at any time. In Luke 12, Jesus tells a parable about a young man who spends his life accumulating wealth but rejecting God: "But God said to him, 'you fool! This very night your life will be demanded from you. Then who will get what you have prepared for yourself?"

What does this mean for us? It simply means that faith cannot be put off until tomorrow; we cannot and should not reject faith, placing a relationship with God on hold. Although God is persistent in his love and

calling for us, if we taste death apart from Him or live in unbelief when Jesus returns, there are no second chances. Christ warns us in the parable of the 10 virgins what happens: "The virgins who were ready went in with him to the wedding banquet. And the door was shut. Later the others came. 'Sir! Sir!' they said. 'Open the door for us!' But he replied, 'I tell you the truth, I don't know you.' Therefore, keep watch because you do not know the day or hour," (Matt. 25:10-13).

The good news is if you are reading this and still

Paul writes: "I tell you, now is the time of God's favor, now is the day of salvation," (2 Cor. 6:2b). What Paul means here is that for those still



living in persistent defiance and unbelief, God's grace and favor is offered here and now, today. God gives life and salvation freely in Jesus Chris, who suffered, died and rose to life again for all people. As Luke writes, "Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to men by which we must be saved," (Acts 4:12).

What Christ does for us in Christ is amazing. In Luke 12:37, the servants waiting for the Master are then served by the Master when He returns! That is God's heart for you. In Christ, He longs to save, love and serve you as only God can.
