Last month, my wife and I received cards expressing thanks for the gifts we gave to those who recently graduated from High School and who were newly married. It is customary for people to send out notes of appreciation to those who have showed kindness to them. We appreciate

receiving them and think it is appropriate to thank others. However, if you were to ask my wife, she thinks that the art or practice of thanking others is not as strong as it was years ago. What do you think? Are people as thankful as they were in the past? Do they appreciate receiving things? Or do they just expect people to give them things?

We live in a country where many people (including youth and children) have ample amounts of food, possessions and clothes. I do realize that there are many people in need throughout our nation – even in our community (and we are to seek to help them). But for a majority of people they have more than what they need. Therefore, I believe a major danger we all face is not appreciating and being thankful for what we have received. I know that this has been the case for me more times than I would like to admit.

In his small catechism, Martin Luther gives this insight in what it means to pray "give us this day are daily bread." He writes:

"God certainly gives daily bread to everyone without our prayers even to all evil people, but we pray in this petition that God would lead us to realize this and to receive our daily bread with thanksgiving."

Daily bread includes everything that we need for our body and life here on earth everything from food and clothing, house and home, having work and good weather to living in a community and nation where there is peace. The Bible makes it very clear that God is not only concerned about us spiritually but also physically as Martin Luther points out. (Continued on next page.)



# Faith Listens to What Mercy Means for Minot

As you go through life, you listen to many voices. You listen to family and friends. You listen to teachers, mentors, counselors and a host of others. You listen to the culture, the media and other influences. So who really influences you? Who shapes your thoughts and behavior? To whom do you truly listen?

This summer, I hope you will listen to the people of Minot because their stories are worth hearing. I was part of a nine-person team comprised of youth and leaders from Beautiful Savior, Our Redeemer in



Moorhead and St. Andrew in West Fargo who travelled to Minot June 18-20 to assist in flood recovery. In just two work days, we helped unload donated furniture, hauled 100 flats of sheet rock to a residence, removed moldy siding from two houses, removed insulation and helped an elderly woman named Delores move furniture back into her home.

Delores had prayed that God would allow her to return around the date of the one-year anniversary when she had been forced to leave her home. It just so happened we were there on that date, placing some of the finishing touches on her prayers.

Delores and the others we served in Minot had a lot to say. They shared stories of bravery amid uncertainty, faith amid disaster and hope amid loss. They cried with us, laughed with us and most of all, shared their lives with us in a very real and intimate way. Will you listen to the people of Minot? Will you hear that the Minot flood remains the only Level 5 disaster after Hurricane Katrina? Will you hear that thousands still remain displaced?

As a Christian, will you listen to the Savior who bore all your sin on the cross? In Him, God listened to your cries for compassion as Jesus took on flesh, suffered, died and rose again for you. In Christ, God listens and heeds your need for mercy and bestows it on you in abundance through the forgiveness of sins for Jesus' sake. Thus, your life is, by nature, one full of mercy.

When Jesus told the story of the Good Samaritan, he painted a picture of someone in need of temporal mercy, a man who had been robbed, beaten and left for dead. The "religious" people of the day ignored the need. They passed by without listening. They turned their ears and eyes from it. Yet a Samaritan

helped his neighbor; he bound the man's wounds, brought him to an inn, nurtured him to health and even paid for the continued care of the man. At the end of the parable, Jesus says



something profound. He asks the lawyer who was testing Him: "Which of these ... do you think proved to be a neighbor to the man who fell among the robbers?" The lawyer responded: "The one who had mercy on Him."

Jesus then says: "Go and do likewise."

Did you catch that? I hope you listen to what Jesus has to say, "Go, and do likewise." This disaster sits in your backyard. Will you listen to what Jesus invites you to do? Will you listen as His Spirit stirs your heart and mind to act? Will you sacrifice a few days, maybe even at the cost of vacation time or personal expense – even as your act of mercy will not impact your salvation in Jesus?

I hope so. As we listened as the people of Minot, what we heard the most was "thank you so much." We listened as they embraced us and wept for joy and gratitude over the work that God had done through us. We listened to stories of answered prayers and confidence in God's goodness. We even heard God speaking to our faith in Christ alone and His transformative work.

After all, Luther writes: "Oh, faith is a living, busy, active, mighty thing, so that it is impossible for it not to be constantly doing what is good. Likewise faith does not ask if good works are to be done, but before one can ask, faith has already done them and is constantly active... Faith is a vital, deliberate trust in God's grace, so certain that it would die a thousand times for it. And such confidence and knowledge of divine grace makes us joyous, mettlesome, and merry toward God and all creatures."

This summer, be mettlesome and merry for your neighbor in Minot. Your neighbor needs you. Listen to the call from Christ and your faith, all speaking to the parable's view of mercy: "Go, and do likewise."

At the beginning of the second paragraph of the Declaration of Independence, we read these words: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness." This document was the unanimous Declaration of the thirteen United States of America in Congress on July 4, 1776.

These words are pretty easy to recite but so difficult to practice. For one thing, freedom is never free. It comes only through great cost, including the sacrifice of dedicated men and women in defense of our national freedoms. In addition, the stain of sin causes us to treat our fellow citizens as inferior according to our own definitions and practices. Consider all the ugly words and accusations that take place as our nation prepares to elect a new president and other government leaders!

In The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod we have used this definition of Christian stewardship for several decades: "Christian stewardship is the free and joyous activity of the child of God and God's family, the church, in managing all of life and life's resources for God's purposes."

Really--Christian stewardship free and joyous? Too often we have all kinds of words that describe Christian stewardship as anything but free and joyous. How can it be free? It is free because the price for it, like the freedom we enjoy as Americans, has been paid for by the sacrifice of someone else. Jesus, through His bitter suffering, death and glorious resurrection, has freed us to be the children of God who delight in doing what God delights in doing—loving and giving!

In gratitude for His working in us, let's resolve to become more and more what God has already declared us in Christ to be, namely, His children. Yes indeed, maturing children of God and stewards freely and joyfully manage all of life and life's resources for God's purposes!
