Word from Pastor Dave

At the end of April, we had one of the trees in our backyard cut down. It was a tree we planted during the first few years we lived in Fargo. We received it as a gift. For more than 20 years, it has provided shade in our yard. However, due to several reasons, it was time for it to go. One of them was because the tree had been struck by lightning. Though it continued to grow, it was never the same. Throughout the year, dead branches periodically fell to the ground. Sooner or later it was



going to have to come down. We decided that it was better to do it soon.

We will miss the tree and the shade that it provided in the summer. Others will miss it as well. Birds perched in it and made their nests. Squirrels frolicked around in that tree and thoroughly infuriated our dogs in the process.

As we look at trees, we only see part of them. We see what is only above ground. Beneath every tree are its roots. For a tree to grow tall and to endure the storms, it needs to have a good foundation underneath it. Without having a good root system, the tree will not be able to thrive. St. Paul reminds Christians in his letter to the Ephesians about the importance of foundations when it comes to our spiritual life. He also describes it like having roots. So vital is it that he includes it in his petitions before God. Paul prays (3:17-19a) that they might be strengthened through the power of the Spirit so that

"Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith—that you, being rooted and grounded in love, may have strength to comprehend with all the saints what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge."


Paul is praying for strong roots that are grounded in love. This is needed so that we may be able to understand everything that God has done for us in Christ. The world is big. The universe is far greater. But even more majestic than all of that is the God who created it all and the God who shows love and tender affection to us because of Jesus Christ.

Christianity is a faith that in one aspect is very simple to grasp.

"God so loved the world that He sent his only begotten Son so that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life," (John 3:16).

On the other hand, Christianity is a faith that is profound. There is depth not only in knowledge but also in the wisdom regarding how we are to live our lives in love.



Called to Kindness in Christ

A New Jersey teacher may lose her job after allowing her third-graders to send get-well cards to Mumia Abu-Jamal, who is serving a life sentence for killing Philadelphia police officer Daniel Faulkner in 1981.

In February, Marilyn Zuniga said she presented her students with an assignment in which they were asked to consider the main idea of the following quote from Abu-Jamal: "So long as one just person is silenced, there is no justice."

About two months later, Zuniga said she told the students about Abu-Jamal's failing health and *they* asked about writing "get well" letters.

On April 5, Zuniga posted a tweet about her students' letters being delivered to Abu-Jamal, which resulted in a severe backlash and a public outcry for her to be fired. The school board has tabled this issue while Zuniga remains suspended with pay.

Many things come into play here. We can question the validity of this taking place in a public school with young students. We can ask if this teacher talked about the seriousness of Abu-Jamal's crime and the appropriate consequences for that crime. We can scrutinize the decision to broadcast this on social media.

Not knowing all the facts, I don't want to offer an opinion if this teacher should be fired. I also don't want to write about what Zuniga should have done; I want to write about what God calls us to do.

We cannot and do not advocate killing. That sin must be recognized. Justice must be done. But this man is in prison for what he has done. He will be in prison his entire life. If someone commits a crime, does that mean that for the rest of their life, all they should receive is condemnation, pain and suffering?

Christians are called to leave behind this world's overdeveloped sense of vengeance. Remember, God has given his authority to allow government to capture, try, convict and sentence. To add punishment by denouncing any kindness goes above what God has instituted.

We can look at Jesus' own actions on the cross when he prayed that God forgive the very people who crucified him! Is it not for this that Jesus came?

To forgive even the worst of sinners? Jesus tells us all manners of sin will be forgiven, even murder. God's son was murdered, even though he was innocent, but he took the punishment for all sin upon himself and broke its power and curse through his rising to life again.

Christ himself instructs us to visit those in prison. He tells us to love our enemies and pray for those who persecute us. Peter tells us not to pay reviling with reviling, but to bless, in other words, speak a good word to others.

Again, we must recognize the severity of the crime and what it cost the Faulkner family. I hope they are surrounded with love and support. But holding on to additional vengeance and hatred means that your God has become rigorous justice itself. Likewise, when you look to someone's suffering to bring ultimate comfort, that person's suffering has become your god.

Take comfort in God! Let God be God in your life and in the life of others. He desires that repentance and forgiveness of sins be preached in His name to all nations and all people! If compassion and kindness in Christ are denied to sinners, then we have taken the Gospel and placed it in a cage. We have told God that salvation is only for those we choose. We have told God that how He dispenses justice is not enough. This is not our place! Then what is?

Peter puts it best when he writes, "But in your hearts, honor Christ the Lord as holy, **ALWAYS** being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with genuineness and respect, having a good conscience, so that, "when you are slandered, those who revile your good behavior in Christ may be put to shame." (1 Peter 3:15).

Christ bids us to leave our hatred and vengeance at the cross. He desires we repent, and receive God's forgiveness and peace in Jesus. Filled with His forgiveness and peace, we show forth the hope we have in Christ alone.
