Word from Pastor Chris

It was a rite of passage.

Every year, this particular LCMS church in a Midwestern suburb would call a vicar. The church would welcome him into their fold, into their worship, into their classrooms, into their lives and into their homes.

One family, in particular, proved eager to welcome the new church worker. After some pleasant conversation and lovely refreshments, the family turned to the business at hand: making sure the new vicar knew -- in full -- all the ways that the church's pastor had disappointed the family over the years. They hoped the vicar would not make the same mistakes.

I've heard that pastors are held to a higher standard. Perhaps that is somewhat biblical as Paul lists several criteria for the office. But high standards often cross the line into impossible standards. Believe it or not, your pastors are human, too. They make mistakes, drop the ball and require Christ's forgiveness. They also require your forgiveness from time to time.

Paul, the great church planter and New Testament author, knew of his own shortcomings even as he preached and taught the Gospel:

The saying is trustworthy and deserving of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am the foremost. But I received mercy for this reason, that in me, as the foremost, Jesus Christ might display his perfect patience as an example to those who were to believe in him for eternal life. To the King of the ages, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory forever and ever. Amen," (1 Tim. 1:15-17).

God has a tendency for making His power perfect in weakness. He uses sinful, fallen broken pastors to deliver his message of forgiveness for Christ's sake. Yes, even your pastors need Jesus.

That's because church is not about your pastor; it's about Jesus. It is to this King and His Word that every pastor commits himself by oath as he assumes office. In this, pastors cannot yield, soften, toss out or compromise. To this, above all else, true pastors must cling even in the face of persecution, and even death.

To this, true pastors obey God rather than men and suffer all things: Namely, true pastors preach and teach Christ crucified as the only way to heaven. True pastors hold fast to God's Word in controversial matters such as human sexuality, closed communion, the pastoral office and creation, among others.

After all, Luther explains what pastors owe God's people:

"He must hold firmly to the trustworthy message as it has been taught, so that he can encourage others by sound doctrine Paster Chris and refute those who oppose it," (Titus 1:9).



On May 19, Matthew Harrison, president of the Lutheran-Church Missouri Synod, released a letter to LCMS pastors to address issues related to an upcoming U.S. Supreme Court ruling on same-sex marriage and its possible implications for the church. Because this could deeply affect our church, the content of the letter is printed below.

In the face of another radical cultural shift—a denial of God and His creation, a rejection of Christ, the Ten Commandments and God-given natural law (Rom. 1)—a great Lutheran responded with truths that are also true for our times:

The lie is the death of man, his temporal and his eternal death. The lie kills nations. The powerful nations of the world have been laid waste because of their lies. History knows of no more unsettling sight than the judgment rendered upon the people of an advanced culture who have rejected the truth and are swallowed upon in a sea of lies. Where this happens, as in the case of declining pagan antiquity, religion and law, poetry and philosophy, life in marriage and family, in the state and society—in short, one sphere of life after another falls sacrifice to the power and curse of the lie. Where man can no longer bear the truth, he cannot live without the lie. Where man denies that he and others are dying, the terrible dissolution [of his culture] is held up as a glorious ascent, and decline is viewed as an advance, the likes of which has never been experienced. (Hermann Sasse, *Union and Confession*, 1936.)

In a few weeks, the U.S. Supreme Court is expected to rule on the legality of same-sex marriage and roll out the implications of that ruling for individual states. I expect the ruling to create an alleged constitutional right to same-sex marriage, contrary to God's created orders, natural law and the inerrant Scriptures. This will be the earnest beginning of a long struggle for faithful Christians who will, more and more, be driven from participation in the culture. We shall come to know and understand parts of the Word of God like never before. "But our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we await a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ" (Phil. 3:20).

Brothers, the battle has already been won. Our Lord, Jesus Christ, has already defeated the foe. Satan surrendered at Golgotha. It is finished. But what do we do? If the Supreme Court rules that same-sex marriage is legal in every state or must be recognized in every state, what is our response?

We stand fast (2 Thess. 2:15). We live in and by our Savior, who calls us to stay the course, repent of our sin and be in the Word of God and prayer. We redouble our teaching on God's gift of marriage. We show love and mercy to those harmed by the

dissolution of God's ordering of marriage and family, intended for protection for all. We take legal action where absolutely necessary. "Public remedy, made through the office of the public official, is not condemned, but is commanded and is God's work, according to Paul (Romans 13)" (Apology XVI 59).

The plan fits the nature of the Church: she is enduring and eternal. She speaks Christ's forgiveness and peace to men and women struggling with same-sex attraction and heterosexual attraction alike, in and out of season. She doesn't do flash-in-the-pan or drive-by ministry. She works in the world for the long haul. She doesn't change her tune or stop her singing. She keeps telling real people about a real Jesus, from black-robed Supreme Court justices to the protestors on the steps of that building to the young people in college watching the ruling unfold to those of us who never imagined we would see this seismic shift in our lifetime. She lives to demonstrate the mercy and love of Christ (1 John 3:15ff).

Most importantly, she speaks of the One who came for sinners—all sinners—and of the One who showed His love for us by dying for us. She simply stays the course.

That's why you, dear brothers in the Office, will need our prayers in the days ahead. And you have them. Legal marriage may be redefined, and outcomes we never imagined will occur. But these don't surprise or alarm us. The crumbling culture proves that what began in the Garden of Eden is still prevalent today, that we are sinners among sinners, that we are all in need of Christ's mercy and grace. This world is wending its way toward the end (Matt. 25). The story ends well (Rev. 7). That is what those in the pew and those disenchanted by the people in the pew need to hear, and will always need to hear, the most.

Beyond the theological consequences of this ruling, however, there are also practical implications, and I urge you to consider the following:

(1) The Synod's legal team is carefully examining the potential ramifications of this case. It will likely be a messy ruling that will require time to unpack. We may discover that there is ultimately no constitutional protection for the Synod, its institutions, you or your congregation. We don't know, but we will be reporting back to you with our findings.

- (2) Your congregation should give serious thought to obtaining counsel from your own attorney. Also consider utilizing the Synod's document on marriage policies for member congregations, which offers sample provisions limiting the use of church property to marriages that are consistent with LCMS beliefs. The day may come when even this legal protection will not be enough, but it may assist you and your congregational leadership in forestalling issues as long as possible.
- (3) Be prepared to discuss what marriage will look like in the future. Will LCMS pastors eventually be forced, as agents of the state, to perform same-sex marriages? If that happens, will we be prepared to let the state perform the legal marriage ceremony, while we as pastors provide a religious ceremony for those marriages that are in keeping with our confession of faith as Lutheran Christians? We must have these discussions as pastors and as a Synod, and we may even need to make decisions at the next Synod convention in the summer of 2016.
- (4) Know that I, as Synod president, stand with you. What protections will the Synod or even the Constitution offer you? I don't know. But here is what I am personally sure of: The Gospel is enduring. It never changes. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever. We as pastors are called to repent and to be faithful to Him—and to His Gospel—alone. Will we be fined for not performing same-sex marriages? Potentially. Will we be thrown in jail? Maybe.

But make no mistake, the battle has been won. The devil has been defeated. The Victor reigns triumphant in mercy, love and truth. The Gospel knows no limits, but proclaims the gracious kingdom of our Lord to all, through Christ's Word and Sacraments.

The temptation will be to run out into the melee, to abandon the home front or to give up all together. But we are called instead to repent, to be ready, to move confidently into the future, come what may. We speak the truth in love to all. We share Christ's forgiveness with each person He sets in our path.

The Lord will work all things for good, even these trying times. He is faithful, brothers. He will do it.
