LCMS President Answers Questions Regarding COVID Vaccine Concerns

Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

In recent weeks, I have received a number of inquiries from concerned members of the Synod about the COVID-19 vaccines as they seek to maintain their support for the sanctity of life and for religious freedom. These questions have come not in the interests of politicizing the matter but out of sincere Christian moral convictions. Having consulted with our district presidents and other agencies of the Synod, I requested that the staff of the Commission on Theology and Church Relations, in collaboration with the Office of National Mission's Life Ministry, draft "The LCMS and COVID-19 Vaccines: Facts and Considerations." On the basis of this counsel, let me address a few of your most pressing questions.

1) Are COVID-19 vaccines related to abortion? The science regarding this is complex. The two vaccines currently approved by the FDA — Pfizer/BioNTech and Moderna — were not designed, developed or produced using cell lines derived from aborted human fetal tissue. Other vaccine candidates — including the UK-approved Oxford/AstraZeneca — did use human fetal tissue, however. The Pfizer/BioNTech and Moderna vaccines did perform laboratory tests using cells derived from abortions (one from 1972 and



Amid so Much Separation, 2021 Lenten Series Invites God's People to "Return to the Lord"

We live in an increasingly fractured and violent society. A pandemic still encroaches upon our everyday lives. Natural disasters rage and destroy.

Sin has set up shop securely, even in the lives of Christians as they adopt and embrace practices and attitudes against God's will. All of this leads to distance between each other and between us and God.

In the middle of all this separation, we find a tender, yet urgent invitation from the Lord: "Return to the Lord your God, for He is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love; and He relents over disaster," (Joel 2:13).

another from 1985) to confirm the final vaccine quality (as, surprisingly, do many other commonly used medications and vaccines). For more information on how the COVID-19 vaccines relate to abortion, I encourage you to consult the website of the pro-life bioethicists at the Charlotte Lozier Institute and the list they maintain there: lozierinstitute.org/an-ethics-assessment-of-covid-19-vaccine-programs/. According to their assessment, neither the Pfizer/BioNTech nor Moderna vaccines contain any substance derived from aborted human fetal cells.

- 2) Does the Synod have a position on the reception of vaccines using human fetal tissue? The Synod does not have an official position on such vaccines at this time. Official decisions of this nature come through the Synod acting in convention, and no convention action has yet been taken. However, our church body remains firmly committed to the sanctify of life, and we continually seek to advocate for pro-life positions in the public square.
- **3) Can I obtain a religious exemption for the COVID-19 vaccine?** Religious or personal belief exemptions are based on conscientious objection and do not require official support from the denomination. The absence of an official Synod stance does not impact your ability to seek an exemption. Please consult your local lawmakers or public health officials for more information on how to proceed should the need arise.
- **4) Should I take the COVID-19 vaccine?** This is a question only you can answer. Some may choose not to take the vaccine because of concerns over its relation to abortion or fear of possible health complications. Others may take it in spite of such reservations out of concern for their own health or that of their neighbor. Because neither Scripture nor the Synod has explicitly addressed this issue, it remains a matter of Christian freedom where you must choose according to your individual conscience.
- **5)** How should I talk about the vaccine with others who disagree with my view of it? In a sensitive issue of this nature, we remember the words of St. James: "Let every person be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger" (James 1:19). Listen carefully and openly to the points of others. Consider them. Share your positions patiently and objectively. Reflect upon your own penchant for error. Forgive others where they sin against you and ask for forgiveness where you wrong them.

In this contentious issue, we must respect the consciences of fellow believers who share our same commitment to Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions, as well as our life together as a Synod. As St. Paul urges us regarding matters of conscience, "let no one seek his own good, but the good of his neighbor" (1 Cor. 10:24), and "let us not pass judgment on one another any longer, but rather decide never to put a stumbling block or hindrance in the way of a brother" (Rom. 14:13). At a time of cultural upheaval, I would encourage you not to allow disagreement even over undoubtedly important matters such as this to take precedence over the faith that unites us in Christ. In all things, we should heed the call to "maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" (Eph. 4:3).

Please study the document mentioned above. It provides a summary of what we know about the COVID-19 vaccines, their relation to the issue of abortion, and what we can (and cannot) say about these matters from the Synod's perspective. I hope it proves useful to you as you wrestle with how to bear Christian witness in this world through your love of both God and neighbor.

Maintain the unit of the Spirit in the bond of peace.

Ephesians 4:3 ESV

"Now may the God of peace who brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, the great shepherd of the sheep, by the blood of the eternal covenant, equip you with everything good that you may do his will, working in us that which is pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory forever and ever. Amen." (Heb. 13:20–21).

God's invitation and promise finds its fullness in Jesus Christ, who personifies and accomplishes all that God declares. During this season of Lent, we will consider the theme "Return to the Lord," examining how God's call to return plays out in practical ways for His people.

God's call also asks us to consider God's judgement against sin. In the Book of Joel, the prophet paints a vivid picture of the coming judgment of God, the Day of the Lord. The bold and terrifying imagery depicts hordes of locusts swarming over the land and devouring everything in its path and leaving mass destruction in its wake.

God's powerful Word calls fallen, broken, rebellious sinners to turn away from the destruction of sin and toward God's grace and mercy in Christ. On the cross, Jesus took the Father's wrath against sin upon Himself. For those repenting of sin and resting in Christ, God promises to "turn and relent, and leave a blessing behind Him," (Joel 2:14).

Due to COVID, we will not host soup and sandwich suppers this year. In addition to Wednesday midweek services, this series will feature a Lenten devotional book as well as a Lenten activity calendar for families. The series will begin at 7 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 17, with the following schedule:

Feb. 17 - Ash Wednesday: A Call to Return (Matt. 6:1-6, 16-21)

Feb. 24 – Midweek Lent 1: Return to Prayer (Matt. 26:36–46)

March 3 – Midweek Lent 2: Return from Betrayal (John 18:1–11)

March 10 - Midweek Lent 3: Return from False Witness (Matt. 26:57–68)

March 17 – Midweek Lent 4: Return from Denial (Luke 22:54–62)

March 24 – Midweek Lent 5: Return to the Kingdom of God (John 18:28)

April 1 – Holy Thursday: Return to the Table (Mark 14:12–26)

April 2 – Good Friday: Return to the Truth (John 19:1–16)

April 4 - Easter Sunday: Return and See (Matt. 28:1–10)

Note: You will need to sign up for Ash Wednesday and Holy Week services through the sign-up genius on the church website. If services fill up, we will add more. We will not be holding Thursday night worship services during Lent. However, Sunday services will still be available on YouTube.


Easter Flowers On Altar

Congregations to vote on pushing back synodical convention to 2023

Beautiful Savior will host a special voter's meeting via Zoom at 6:30 p.m. Monday, Feb. 1, to give input on delaying synodical convention to 2023. (See information below to attend the meeting.)

Due to the ongoing effects of the COVID-19 some districts may not be able to convene this year for district convention. The North Dakota District cancelled its original date for the 2021 convention.

The LCMS Council of Presidents voted unanimously in November to encourage LCMS President Rev. Dr. Matthew C. Harrison to put a proposal before congregations to delay the 2022 Synodical convention one year to 2023. The vote, which requires participation of at least one quarter of the Synod's congregations, will conclude Feb. 15.



Learning Patience

"But do not overlook this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day. The Lord is not slow to fulfill his promise as some count slowness, but is patient toward you, not wishing that any should perish, but that all should reach repentance." (2 Peter 3:8-9).



She was a picture of patience as little Bobby pushed her buttons. "Mommy, I want to ride in the cart." "Mommy, can I get that bike?" "Mommy, why can't I get that bike?" "Mommy, I want out of the cart." "Mommy, can we go home?" "Mommy, why can't we go home now?" "Mommy, I want to ride in the cart." "Mommy, I want some candy." "Mommy, why can't I have some candy?"

Through it all, she didn't get angry. She didn't speak harshly. She gently responded to each request. She tenderly answered each question. She was the perfect picture of patience. Now, maybe you're a parent and as you read this you say to yourself, "I wish I were like that. I need more patience!" Who doesn't say or think that from time to time? "I need to be more patient."

But how do we learn patience? We learn it from the one who truly is the perfect picture of patience. We learn from the Lord who "is not slow to fulfill his promise as some count slowness, but is patient toward you, not wishing that any should perish, but that all should reach repentance." (2 Peter 3:8-9).

We learn true patience when we understand how patient God is with us. If you made a big mistake at work, your boss might fire you. If you made that same big mistake at work, day after day, your boss would definitely fire you. If we were to think of God as our boss and we make the same mistakes day after day, then it would seem that God should fire us.

But he doesn't. He is patient with us. Day after day, he sees our mistakes. Day after day, he sees our sin. And day after day, he forgives us as we repent. He doesn't hold our sin against us. How can he be so patient? He doesn't want to fire us; he wants to spend eternity with us. So, he sent his Son, Jesus, to take our sins away from us. Jesus took upon himself the punishment that we deserve. And because the price has already been paid, he is patient with us, "not wishing that any should perish, but that all should reach repentance."


