Christ's Resurrection Remains our Confidence

With so many views on what happens when we die, some have probably questioned your Christian faith directly: "How do you know that you hold true beliefs?" Perhaps you even have wrestled with this question yourself.

Although some may argue that the answer rests entirely on faith, Christianity takes confidence from events in human history. The center of God's activity among mankind rests in what we confess in the Second Article of the Apostle's Creed: That Jesus Christ, the God-man, was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried. He descended into hell. The third day, he rose again from the dead.

Did you get that last part? Rose again?

For all their different views, Moses, Muhammed, Confucius, Buddha, Joseph Smith, L. Ron Hubbard -- along with a host of others who have shaped and formed various belief systems -- share one thing. They died, and they stayed dead. Can they really speak of what awaits us after death? Do they really have true wisdom or power that can be trusted? Are you willing to bet your afterlife on them?

The resurrection sets Jesus apart from all other "religious" leaders, figures and founders. The enemies of sin and the grave did their worst to Jesus, but Christ broke their power. The One who had proclaimed Himself as the fulfillment of God's salvation during His public ministry, Jesus appeared alive again after his crucifixion and burial to drive the point home. What Jesus had proclaimed wasn't impossible or unthinkable. Christ had done exactly what He had promised:

"These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the Law of Moses and the Prophets and the Psalms must be fulfilled. Then he opened their minds to understand the Scriptures, and said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Christ should suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that repentance for the forgiveness of sins should be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem," (Luke 24:-47).

But how can you know?

Witnesses. Lots and lots of witnesses. The apostle Paul lists some, but not all of them: "For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have fallen asleep. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me," (1 Corinthians 15:3-8).

How can you be sure? When history happens, witnesses can attest to the validity of what happened. Enough of the Christian community experienced what happened, then bore consistent witness about it. This bold and joyous apostolic witness rings forth and remains our confidence by the power of the Holy Spirit: "But, in fact, Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. For as by a man came death, by a man has come also the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive," (1 Corinthians 15:20-22).

Are You Ready to be Judged?

"Because [God] has fixed a day on which He will judge the world in righteousness by a man whom He has appointed; and of this He has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead," (Acts 17:31).

"From thence He will come to Judge the living and the dead." (from the Apostle's Creed).

Have you ever attended a children's art fair? Some of these art fairs have hundreds of pieces representing countless hours of work hung on the walls. The art is judged. White, red, blue and "judges' choice" ribbons are attached to some of the pieces. A majority of the art, though, does not receive a ribbon. I don't know about you, but I would not want my artwork to be judged.

Most people don't like to be judged. They don't look forward to job reviews, physical checkups and relationship guizzes. What will their boss, doctor or people close to them say? How will they be judged? God forgives

One day we will all be judged. In His Word, God says that He has set a day when Jesus will judge the world every single one of us. Our Judge demands that we be perfect. Our sinful hearts, lying, cursing, hatred and all of our sins testify against us. We are far from perfect.

Why does God tell us this? God does not want us to falsely hope in ourselves. He tells us this "so that every mouth may be stopped, and the whole world may be held accountable to God." On our own, we are without excuse or defense. We cannot "try" our way out from under His judgment. "For by works of the law no human being will be justified in His sight, since through the law comes knowledge of sin," (Romans 3:19-20).

Is all hope lost? If it were up to us, yes. But thanks be to God. In His grace, God intervened on our behalf and provides what we could not. God gives us His righteousness. For us, Jesus lived a perfect life, died on the cross and rose from the dead. In Christ, God declares us not guilty. Sinners like you and me are forgiven. Jesus has bought our freedom. God smiles on us. By faith in Jesus, He gives us our eternal home in His presence forever.

Through Jesus, you are ready to be judged. Jesus stands at your side. He points to His perfect life, His death in your place and His resurrection. Then He points ahead as He leads you to your eternal home with Him in the new heavens and the new earth.

What is "Pentecost"?

The word "Pentecost" (pronounced PEN-tuh-kost) comes from the Greek word pentekostos which means "fiftieth." Exactly 50 days after Jesus rose from the dead, the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples in the form of flames of fire.



Why is Pentecost so important?

When Jesus died, the disciples were sad because they thought that their friend and Lord was gone forever. But Jesus rose again! Forty days after His resurrection, Jesus did finally ascend into heaven leaving the disciples below. However, before Jesus actually died, rose again and ascended into heaven, He made a promise to His disciples that He would send the Holy Spirit to them. He said that the Holy Spirit would come and guide them "into all the truth" (John 16:13). Jesus doesn't leave us alone to fend for ourselves. Jesus is here with us, and the Holy Spirit guides and leads the Church into the truth of the wonderful Gospel! We celebrate and remember this at Pentecost.



Parents:

At home, read the story of Pentecost in Acts 2 to your children. Remind them that the Holy Spirit comes to us through the Word and Sacraments just as our Lord has promised. Encourage them to thank God for the gift of His Holy Spirit in their lives.
