## Not All Teaching is Created Equal

Does it matter to God what we teach, what we preach and what we pass on?

Does it matter to God, for instance, that we teach a six-day creation account? Does it matter to God if we teach a Biblical view of sexuality? Does it matter to God if we proclaim salvation as a free gift given and won through Christ's suffering death and resurrection?

Scripture makes it clear that truth should be embraced at all costs while falsehood should be avoided at all costs. Throughout the history of God communicating with His people, God warns about following false prophets, false teachers and false doctrine.

How much does truth matter? Early in God's creation, God warned Adam and Eve what would happen if they ate from the tree of knowledge of good and evil. When the serpent baited our first parents with falsehood, the whole world suffered the consequences.

Jesus came as the embodiment of God's truth. When appearing before Pontius Pilate, Jesus tells him, "For this purpose I was born and for this purpose I have come into the world—to bear witness to the truth. Everyone who is of the truth listens to my voice," (John 18:37b).

After Peter confesses Jesus as the Christ, Jesus explained that the Christ was sent to suffer and die and rise again. Peter could not bear the truth of those words and attempted to correct Jesus that this could not possibly be God's will. Jesus responds rather harshly, calling Peter's words Satanic. "Get behind me Satan," Jesus says. "You are a hindrance to me. For you are not setting your mind on the things of God, but on the things of man," (Matt. 16:23).

This means that not every teaching or viewpoint is acceptable. Like Pilate, we can't pretend the truth cannot be known. Like Peter, we cannot measure truth by our own fallen reason, understanding and supposedly noble (yet fallen) sensibilities.

## Not All Teaching is Created Equal

Throughout his ministry, Jesus made it plain that he had come to preach, teach and reveal all truth from the Father. As He sent the disciples out, Jesus then sends them with diligence (and the Holy Spirit) to preach and teach that same word of truth. This apostolic practice, continuing from the history of God speaking through the prophets, maintained a very strict measure of truth. Adding to or subtracting from what God said would result in disaster.

Not all teaching is created equal. Things must be validated and confirmed by truth given to us by God in the sacred writings of the Bible. Because of our sinful nature, we don't want to embrace truth. We blindly cling to false human assumptions and desires that distort reality. Sadly, this even happens to people in the church. The apostle Paul, in his instructions to the young pastor Timothy writes: "I charge you in the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and by his appearing and his kingdom: preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with complete patience and teaching. For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off into myths," (2 Tim. 4:1-4).

Why would Paul and Jesus take such a stand? Everywhere in Scripture, truth matters. Truth is central. Truth colors how we see the world, God and ourselves. What we believe and receive, what we teach and preach, has eternal implications and consequences for our salvation.

Truth matters to God; it should matter to us.

## Exalted for Us

During the prime of his career, Muhammad Ali was sitting on a plane waiting for takeoff, when the flight attendant walked by and kindly reminded him to fasten his seat belt. The great boxer joked, "Superman don't need no seat belt." The flight attendant said, "Superman don't need no plane either." Responding to her remark the great fighter fastened his seat belt. Ali was probably just having fun with the flight attendant, but the exchange reveals something about human nature. We tend to think of ourselves more highly than we ought. In addition, our culture sends the message that humility is a sign of weakness: If you are humble, people will walk all over you, and you will never get ahead.

Jesus' entire life sends a different message. The Bible points to it as the ultimate example of humility: "Christ Jesus, who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be grasped, but made himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself and became obedient to death—even death on a cross!" (Phil. 2:6-8) Even though Jesus was more powerful than a superman, he never once flaunted it. Even though he is the creator of the universe, he never used his control over nature to bring himself glory or honor. Instead he made himself nothing—the Son of God humbled himself to death on a cross.

But God exalted Jesus to the "highest place and gave him the name that is above every name." (Phil. 2:9) Even though Jesus looked more like a worm than a man as he hung suffering on the cross, on the third day God glorified him by raising him from the dead. Forty days later he gave Jesus the position of highest authority at his right hand in the heavenly realms. One day, everyone will acknowledge his glory.

Right now, we can acknowledge his glory and "confess that Jesus Christ is Lord." Jesus humbled himself for each of us to become our sin. His exaltation guarantees that all those who trust in Him will go where He has gone. Even now as we live humbly here on earth, we can place our faith in a Savior who forgives our sins and uses His exalted glory for the good of His people.

God exalted [Christ Jesus] to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. (Phil. 2:9-11)
